What Happened:
With unemployment still high and many families cutting back on spending, the Christmas season isn't quite the materialistic free-for-all for many families that it's been in the past. No one knows this better than Santa Claus.

According to the Associated Press, Mr. Claus-or rather, his mall-based representatives-are reporting that the children they talk with are asking for fewer gifts this year, and they're often asking for gifts for others: a job for Dad, rent money, food...

One Santa recalls how one little boy asked for toilet paper. His mother apparently had been taking napkins from fast-food restaurants for bathroom use. "He wanted to buy her real toilet paper-a common, everyday item that we all take for granted," Santa said, "and this child is thinking this is a Christmas gift."
