Praise the LORD. How good it is to sing praises to our God, how pleasant and fitting to praise him!... He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds. (Psalm 147:1, 3)

INTO THE LIGHT TOUR CENTENNIAL CHAPEL OF OLIVET NAZARENE UNIVERSITY/ BOURBONNAIS, IL

By the time Matthew West launched the latest leg of his Into The Light outing, he received over 25,000 letters from fans telling their intensely personal stories, which continue to spark ideas for his remarkably relatable songwriting. After all, there's no one better to tell a tale than the Chicago-bred/Nashvillebased troubadour, who's newest, narrative-ripe Sparrow Records release helped usher this show to sold-out status.

After blasting off with previous pop hits like "The Motions" and "More," the incredibly interactive headliner dove in an even more ponderous direction, urging attendees to break free from comfort zone isolation during "My Own Little World" and calling for social justice on the Compassion International-themed "Do Something."







Perhaps the night's most powerful moments came during "Hello, My Name Is" and "Forgiveness," respectively accompanied by big-screen testimonies of a recovered drug addict and a mother who forgave the drunk driver who killed her daughter. And when that very lady named Renee Napier stepped on stage to expand upon those sentiments, there wasn't a dry eye in the house, which coupled with West's compelling spoken and sung conversations, surely provided an enormous jolt of encouragement to all.

Supporting pop/rockers Sidewalk Prophets also served up several faith-elevating selections from their recent project, *Live Like That* (Fervent Records), including a stirring acoustic version of "Help Me Find It," featuring the whole band and opener Jason Castro gathered around a campfirelike circle.





Speaking of Castro, the "American Idol" star turned Word Records recording artist split his time between the show's favorite covers (like Judy Garland's "Over The Rainbow") and his current original release *Only A Mountain*, which further demonstrated his bountiful pipes, easygoing acoustics and meaningful songwriting.

SETH AND NIRVA UNITE!

While Seth and Nirva may be new names to most, chances are, if you're a concert-going CCM fan, you've probably seen them live! They both got their start singing background for various artists like TobyMac, Kirk Franklin and Chris Tomlin, just to name a few.

After years of ministry apart, however, the couple (who have been married for 7 years) felt the nudging of the Holy Spirit to walk in a different direction together. That path has led them to the forthcoming release of the first album, *I Need You*.

CCM got to chat with the duo about marriage, ministry and music...

CCM: After such amazing solo gigs, how did this new moniker and EP come about? NIRVA: We've made careers of singing background for Christian artists and other artists and have finally been afforded the opportuniy to make this EP.

SETH: We've loved being a part of other people's ministries. After we got married, we decided to do ministry and travel together. We started working on stuff, but we have somewhat busy lives... It took five years to do six songs. But we're ready to jump in and get started !

CCM: Given the diversity of the artists you've worked with in the past, how would you describe your sound?

NIRVA: The collection of songs is pretty diverse. There's pop, funk, soul, hip-hop and R&B, all mixed together to create a message of hope.

SETH: When we started four or five years ago, I took a few songs she'd already been

working on, looked at some of my songs, and started noticing there was a nice flow to the content thematically. Basically we laid it out and saw a theme of testimony—testifying to what He has done. In a sense, the album is that testimony. It goes in to free people. God sets us free through gospel and spirit.

CCM: Is your personal testimony reflected here? What do your faith journeys look like?

NIRVA: I didn't grow up in church. I was born again in college. I sang with a traveling ensemble group and one night we visited a church while they were having a revival. I ran to the altar before she was even done preaching. I found Jesus and began to work with him personally.

SETH: I did grow up in a Christian home. My parents were very dedicated with their relationship with Christ. It was a blessing. But when you go off to college, you have to make your faith your own. College was a struggle for me intellectually. That's part of what has motivated me to be in young adult ministry. I've been the young adult pastor at Crossing Church in Tampa, Fla., for two years. Tampa is one of the most un-churched cities in the nation. Around 60-80 percent of of young adults leave the church after high school. I thought it was an intellectual issue, but more times than not, realized it was relational. A lot of people feel like there's a lack of authenticity in the church, which is why you have to connect with people and get to know them. It's about being in life with people.

CCM: On the relationship note, how have you two managed to work together creatively, while maintaining a happy marriage? **NIRVA:** We naturally get along well, which makes it a lot easier. We definitely work at it. It takes understanding and a willingness to work at even *knowing* how to work at it. It all comes down to God-given grace.

SETH: The further we get into this adventure, the more we're seeing some potential issues. We were working on a Christmas program once and I was in producer mode. I took the liberty to ask her to change some things she was doing. She then took the liberty to tell me to ask her if she wanted to change things.

NIRVA (LAUGHING): Whenever we are on stage together, it feels natural. I feel so much stronger and have so much more fun with him.

ifteen thousand people pack the seats across the arena. Thousands of voices join their favorite artists, singing the words they know by heart. In the middle of the noise and the excitement, I quietly pray. The words of Psalm 71 flow through my head like they have a thousand times:

As for me, I will always have hope; I will praise you more and more.

My mouth will tell of your righteous deeds, of your saving acts all day long—though I know not how to relate them all.I will come and proclaim your mighty acts, Sovereign Lord; I will proclaim your righteous deeds, yours alone.Since my youth, God, you have taught me, and to this day I declare your marvelous deeds.Even when I am old and gray, do not forsake me, my God,till I declare your power to the next generation, your mighty acts to all who are to come.

Every night at Winter Jam, I get to share the truth of the Gospel. But before I step on that stage, before I open my mouth, I give it up to God one more time. Across the country, hundreds more are joining me in prayer through Facebook or Twitter.

Every night, the prayer is the same: "Lord, would You do it again?"

Jesus is the reason I speak. All my words need to point to Him. In a way, Winter Jam is a glimpse of heaven. I mean, think about it—thousands of people from all backgrounds, coming together for one purpose. This is what we were made for—to stand alongside brothers and sisters in worship of Jesus.

Winter Jam is a family. It's a place to admit that we don't have it all together. In a room of thousands, there's bound to be almost any struggle, sin, or situation imaginable. And Jesus offers a supernatural reset to each one of them.

Families come together. Churches invest in their youth groups. Leaders are encouraged. Every night, people are being poured into and transformed by the Gospel.

With all my heart I believe Winter Jam is a modern-day movement of God. People may come for bands or for a great concert experience, and they'll get it. But every night, after the last note rings across the arena,

something is different. Lives have been reset.

HOW A MOVEMENT MOVES

When Eddie Carswell, founding member of Newsong and Winter Jam's founder, laughingly says, "this doesn't make sense," one is inclined to agree.

For the last three years, Winter Jam has been the No. 1 tour in the world for firstquarter entertainment across all genres. That means it topped Justin Bieber, Lady Gaga and even Taylor Swift.

How?

"It's all God," says Russ Lee of Newsong. "We've tried to hold this thing with open hands."

From those extended palms, God has poured enormous blessing on the effort and, as a result, has changed the eternal destinations of countless individuals.

This year, Winter Jam celebrates its 18th??? Year. Per usual, the lineup is second to none. The Newsboys snagged the headlining spot and are joined by Lecrae, Tenth Avenue North, Thousand Foot Krutch, Plumb, Everfound, Love & the Outcome, Derek Minor, Colton Dixon and, of course, Newsong.

"I think this is our fifth time out with Winter Jam," says Duncan Phillips of Newsboys. "The area shows are super fun. We're always thinking on the bigger scale with our live show."

When it comes to size, they're in the right place. It just doesn't get any bigger than Winter Jam. But unlike other massive tours and entertainment experiences, the numbers represent more than tickets sold. They also represent the number of souls that have been saved while attending. "Over 100,000 people each year make decisions for Christ," says Nick. "It's pretty enormous numbers, but I don't credit that to what I'm saying. I don't try to be God in terms of what they're understanding. Our heart is to be a stepping stone to take that next step."

That intentionality has resulted in elevating the entire franchise. It's not just another tour. There's something special about it and the artists involved don't take that for granted.

"It's an honor," says Jeff Owen of Tenth Avenue North. "We had such a great time last time."

That sentiment is echoed by Colton Dixon, who is enjoying his first go-round with Winter Jam.

"I remember coming to Winter Jam when Steven Curtis Chapman headlined and Skillet was way back in the lineup," Colton says with a laugh. "It's one of the coolest things to meet these people. They've exceeded my expectations every time. It's crazy to be sharing a stage with them."

Another newcomer to the Winter Jam stage is certainly no new-comer to the Christian music industry; however, the last few years have seen them re-invent from label frontrunners to indie artists, still racking up No. 1 placements on charts—Thousand Foot Krutch.

"We are very honored to be part of Winter Jam for the first time," says TFK front man Trevor McNevan. "We're excited to inject some rock into the spectacle. The big challenge with this one is deciding what you're gonna play in such a short amount of time. You've got to do something that

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represents the band—where we're going and where we've been."

That challenge is met with intense planning, practice and prayer from everyone involved. And above all, each artist, speaker and manager has been able to be a part of the magic of Winter Jam because they knew exactly who they're doing it for and how it's going to continue at this rate of success complete surrender to God.

"For me, just the intentionality of experiencing of what God's been doing is key," says Nick. "This is what I sense is happening in the churches and with the students. We need to come alongside and really raise awareness."

Mike Donehey rounds that out by sharing a quote that sums up the heartbeat of this tour.

"Mother Teresa said, We can do no great things. Only small things with great love," Mike shares. What started small has become great. And it's become great because it's been intentional, focused and surrendered.

THESE THREE REMAIN: HOPE, FAITH AND LOVE

I still remember the night I heard the words, "Tonight, everything changed."

A girl approached me after Winter Jam, explaining her feelings of loneliness and hopelessness. She struggled with depression, and she told me about her history of abuse and self-harm. Then she stuck out her hand and dropped a necklace in my open hand. She had worn this necklace every day to remind herself that she was worthless. Attached to the necklace was a razor blade.

"I don't want to wear this anymore," she told me. "I don't want to see myself as the world sees me. I want to see myself as God sees me."



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It's easy to get caught up in the broad scope of Winter Jam—countless cities and hundreds of thousands of people from every walk of life. Yet, every crowd of 15,000 is made up of 15,000 people who need Jesus. Every note played and word said echoes the prayer that lives will be transformed. From loneliness. From hopelessness. From pain inflicted by others or by themselves.

Winter Jam has been an incredible way to call our nation back to Jesus, to reach this generation with the Gospel. Individuals are being brought into the body of Christ, welcomed as part of a family. More people have given up their razor blades. Consistently, we hear stories of God's children realizing that Jesus offers them freedom and healing from all their pain—a reset. Everyone involved in Winter Jam plays their part in sharing the truth of the Gospel. We want to look in each person's eyes and say, "You—God loves YOU."

I am so blessed to be a part of a tour that lifts the name of Jesus high and ministers to all people. God is reaching this generation, and He's inviting all of us to be a part of it. CCM

It's every performer's worst nightmare.

You're center stage... the lights are down, save the spotlight on you...you start playing...you start singing...and nothing. Mic's dead.

(Did we mention this is televised?)

No, this isn't just a psychological exercise to see how well you might handle stressful situations like this; it's what happened at the 44th Annual Dove Awards...and it couldn't have happened to a better artist.

A consummate professional, he kept playing while a black-clad stage runner finally delivered a live mic, inserting it not-so-discreetly into the boom mic (yes...still on tv!).

Surprisingly, this was not a veteran artist whose years of stage experience had prepared them for anything; rather this artist was a 22-year-old from Murfreesboro, Tenn., who had already weathered and survived some pretty harsh performance situations on national TV. "Crazy as it was, musically and spiritually, it was God's initiation into music ministry and it was great," he recalls.

While "Idol" launched him into the limelight of the music world, his talent and passion have kept him there.

"I started taking piano when I was 8," he says. "I remember learning 'I Can Only Imagine,' by Mercy Me. I was overwhelmed by the feeling that this was my true calling. I gave up baseball."

Good move. Between "American Idol" and the present, Colton has signed with Sparrow Records and he released his debut album, *A Messenger*, in 2013. The album re-releases January 2014, but he's already got his sopho-

Of course, we're talking about Colton Dixon, who was one of the standouts on American Idol, Season 11.

Always a professional, he only laughs as we reminisce over the hiccup at the Doves. Of course, considering his life over the past few years, a little crazy-ness is par for the course.

"It has been crazy," he says. "I was going to do 'American Idol' with my sister."

At least that was the plan the first time around. Both Colton and his sister auditioned for Season 10, but neither made it all the way to Hollywood. This time, Colton went all the way. At least to number 7. more record in the works.

"We started writing for record two this past summer and will be recording it this coming summer," says Colton.

Between now and then, Colton will be keeping himself busy with a stint on a littleknown tour that happens to be the number one tour in the world—Winter Jam.

"This was on my bucket list," Colton says with a laugh. "Winter Jam has been my number one choice. I'm so excited. I remember coming to Winter Jam when Steven Curtis Chapman headlined and Skillet was way up in the lineup."

Things have changed a bit since then.



Newsboys are headlining the tour, alongside a lineup that includes Lecrae, Tenth Avenue North, Thousand Foot Krutch, Plumb, Newsong, Everfound, Love & The Outcome and Derek Minor and, of course, Colton. With the West Coast leg in full swing, Colton has already experienced a little idol fever himself.

"One of the coolest things has been meeting these people," says Colton. "They've exceeded my expectations every time. A lot of them were my idols growing up."

It's also a far cry from the American Idol experience.

"On 'American Idol,' you were so disconnected from friends and family," says Colton. "That verse that says God will never leave you or forsake you—I realized it was Him kind of pulling me through the whole journey. It was a comforting time for me and something I felt needed to be shared. A lot of us are like kids, afraid of the dark. We want to jump up and turn the light back on. We need proof that the light is still there."

For one who's getting used to spotlights by now, Colton hasn't lost a bit of his desire to share the true light with the rest of the world.

And if the calm, cool professionalism he exhibited at the Doves is any indication, God's just getting him started.

the age of 1, most parents are celebrating the first steps, a birthday cake in the face and perhaps an intelligible word or two.

We'll just say Jonathan Thulin was advanced. He started singing by age 1 and recorded his first album with his family by age 6.

Now that he's well into his 20s, the little boy who sang with his family alongside the Gaithers and Carman has decidedly come into his own. Riding the success of his "Dead Come to Life" song, Jonathan is touting a new solo album and is still wrapping his head around the rest of it.

"When I left to go to Sweden on tour, 'Dead Come ot Life' was number 29 on CHR," he says. "When I came back, it had gone to number one. It was amazing. I've gotten so many letters from people who have been impacted by the song. We wrote it in about 20 minutes. It was based off the story in "White Room was a very personal record to write. the Bible of Ezekiel and the dry bones. It's a relevant theme for people—God brings everything dead to life."

The success of that song was a turning point for Jonathan and his ministry in more ways than one. Now, churches are calling him for booking and radio stations around the country are all over the song and the man behind it.

Now, that man has a new record...in more ways than one.

"White Room was a very personal record to write," says Jonathan. "A lot of times everything is focused on the positive and encouraging. But I had been through a difficult time in my life. I had always been in ministry, but I didn't really understand that you have to have your own relationship with God. Around age 20, I had to start all over with God. I learned you couldn't live off ministry. I had to find Jesus for myself. And it's going to be a process and journey for the rest of my life."

It's a journey that Jonathan is committed to sharing as transparently and creatively as possible.

"It's a journey I'll be on for the rest of my life," he affirms. "It has to be real. I want to see and feel love for what it is. How do we know what's right and wrong? There has to be a God and creator. Love is breathed into everything."



As he has sought to translate that love into a language his heart can understand, he first has to go back to the beginning and acknowledge the influence of his surroundings—way back when and now.

"In Sweden, things are very different. It's black and white. There's no middle ground. You're a Christian or you're not," Jonathan shares. "Here, there are so many denominations, it's confusing and people completely lose track. I lived in so much guilt and shame trying to become a certain denomination or be what a certain church wants. In the Bible, you look at the woman who was caught in adultery. She knows who she is, what she's done. But when she's lying there, there's just one voice left. The one person who could condemn her didn't. He knew she was human. Love didn't condemn her." "The plan for the new album, *The White Room*, includes a movie and book. As he recounts the familiar Bible stories, it's easy to hear the artist gene inside of him which plays out in his music videos, which are surprisingly quite long and very cinematic.

With the creative wheels ever-turning inside his mind, it's clear that Jonathan Thulin is just getting started. As his own creativity wraps around the epic stories of faith in scripture, chances are, his musings are well on their way to a screen near you.

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LIVING SACRIFICE

Long before faithflanked metal was accepted by the mainstream or even within the walls of the church. Living Sacrifice was blazing trails for future generations of alternative acts. Over two decades later, the group is still going strong, not only earning widespread acceptance amidst all audiences, but also boasting a past and present lineup of members who have also P.O.D, Evanescence, Demon Hunter and Norma Jean. These days, the veteran heavy rockers are applying a full-circle approach to Ghost Thief (Solid State Records/ Tooth & Nail Records), and while everyone's clearly confident with their elder statesmen status, front man/ guitarist Bruce Fitzhugh tells CCM there's still one more item left on his bucket list for the band.

CCM: How do you account for the group's longevity for over 20 years? BRUCE FITZHUGH: I really

don't know. We are all really good friends and we enjoy playing together. I guess just a desire to keep writing and playing.

CCM: How has faith-based hard rock/metal evolved since you first began? FITZHUGH: Well, when we first began, there were not many heavy Christian bands around to look to. Stryper was the biggest, and we were just so different from them. We were definitely mentored a bit by the guys in Believer and The Crucified. We are still friends with them today. What we were doing was shunned for sure by the larger metal community, but that seems to have subsided a lot with the popularity of bands like As I Lay Dying and Underoath.

CCM: What do you hope to add to the current scene with Ghost Thief?

FITZHUGH: We really hope that people can hear the place that we come from,

which is late 80s and early 90s thrash and metal. Stylistically there are not a lot of groups doing that anymore and almost none who call themselves a "Christian band." I hope we are filling a void for some dude or girl out there that loves this style of music.

CCM: The group's past and present membership truly reads like an all-star band. How has having so many successful players enhanced the group?

FITZHUGH: It's been really amazing. All these dudes came out of Arkansas and toured the world on some of the biggest tours of the day for that time period. It's just crazy. I, not being one of the guys that went on to play and perform in a multi-platinum band, am just blessed to still jam with these guys and call them true friends. I am really proud of what we started and how everyone followed their passion in music and art.

CCM: What does the band hope to accomplish that it hasn't already?

FITZHUGH: We have no expectations really, though personally, I would love to do more shows internationally. It has to work out for everyone, though, and that is tough with each guy's obligations and commitments. If it's meant to happen, it will.

loria Gaynor was G appointed Queen of Disco years ago with an incredible career built on the strength of singles like "I Will Survive" and "Never Can Say Goodbye." After performing in 80 countries and receiving numerous awards, Gaynor has now turned her attention toward a gospel project that represents her heart for music and ministry.

We Will Survive is the latest release from Gaynor, and it captures fan responses to her biggest hit and how they've survived and overcome their own trials. An accompanying book brings it all together

and shows that Gaynor is not only surviving, but thriving after decades in the industry.

CCM: How long have you considered a gospel music project? GLORIA GAYNOR: It's

something I've wanted to do for many years, but found it a bit difficult to get all the elements together to bring it to fruition.

CCM: The songs on the album come from fan responses to your music. Any common themes that have emerged? GLORIA: I've had people tell me that the song encouraged and empowered

them to leave abusive relationships, but they found it difficult to forgive the perpetrator. Others have said they were inspired to make it through one dreadful illness or another. and they felt blessed to be given the strength to do so. Some have said that even after being inspired by the song and making it through something traumatic, they weren't sure if they'd missed out on other opportunities because they'd procrastinated.

CCM: Did you always picture the project as a book as well? Or how did that idea enter the picture?

GLORIA: Although I'd wanted to record a Christian CD for years, the idea for the book came years before I actually did it and the idea for this particular choice of song lyrics came from the subject matter in the book.

CCM: Can you tell us what you have planned for 2014? GLORIA: I plan to do more Christian music. I plan to write at least one more book. I plan to continue traveling and performing. I plan to continue working with "Toastmasters" to hone my abilities as a speaker because I'd like to lecture young parents on the importance of children having their fathers physically present in their lives.

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The Indies

Indie Artist – the phrase itself denotes something that is almost indefinable. It covers a vast expanse of singers, songwriters and groups that play the music they want to play, even though that music doesn't usually represent what is currently getting radio airplay.

THE HANDS AND FEET OF CHRIST

"As You sent Me into the world, I have sent them into the world." — Jesus in John 17:18

As followers of Christ, we bear the responsibility of demonstrating to the world what Jesus might look like were He to walk the earth today. Those who will never enter the door of a church or read a Bible or hear a sermon can still know Jesus by watching us! I'm not sure I always give others the right impression, but I met someone who does.

Tseghe, a 14-year-old Ethiopian girl, was abducted by a stranger as she walked to school.

Because the man lacked money to pay the bride price, he simply stole Tseghe from the

side of the road, intending to make her his wife. He took her shoes so she couldn't run and marched her miles from her home to a shack, where he bound and assaulted her.

Although everyone in the village heard what had happened, no one came to her aid. "She's damaged goods," they said. "Leave well enough alone. That's just the way things are. If you can't afford a bride, you just take one."

But Tseghe's grandmother was determined to find her, and she recruited Esatu, a World Vision staff member, to help. When Esatu first went to the police, they refused to act. But he persisted, and over the course of the next several days, Tseghe was found and returned home.



I asked the older woman what Esatu's efforts had meant to her. "It would have been enough," she said, "if he had just come alongside me and been my friend, but he did so much more."

In that instant, my mind flashed to another desert in another country and a stable in a town called Bethlehem. Looking at the Creator of the universe lying helpless in a manger, some might say it would have been enough had Jesus simply come alongside us to be our Friend. But of course, that wasn't enough at all, because more than a friend to walk beside us, more than an example to follow, what we really needed was a Savior.

Esatu had already done plenty. He'd worked hard to provide for the needs of the community, and rescuing Tseghe wasn't his responsibility. But that thought never crossed his mind.

When Esatu came to the aid of a young girl and her desperate grandmother, he was just doing what Jesus would have done if He had been there on that terrible day.

And in a way, Jesus was. Esatu's hands were Jesus' hands; Esatu's heart was Jesus' heart. When wicked men sought to steal away a young girl's dignity and hope for the future, Jesus came to Tseghe's rescue in the person of a man named Esatu.

Is there someone you know who needs Jesus, someone to whom you can demonstrate through your friendship, your encouragement, your wise counsel, the love of the Savior? Look at the people around you. You just might be the only Jesus they will ever see. CCM

FOR HOPE LUKE SMALLBONE FINDS GRACE IN THE DARKNESS

Illness doesn't discriminate. Around the world countless lives are wrecked by health problems. It doesn't matter who you are, what you do or even whose you are. Such as in the case of Luke Smallbone, one-half of for King & Country, Luke was struck with an illness that could have ended his career or worse. But it was in the midst of this darkness that Luke experienced something he never had felt as purely, desperately and intensely—hope. Luke shares the journey and lessons learned below.

When I look back over the past year, it's certainly been a whirlwind of sorts. On Halloween 2012, I was diagnosed with a digestive disorder that, quite frankly, I didn't take that seriously, and sadly wasn't informed about the severity that could take place. I left the doctors not thinking much about my health, jumped in a van and headed out on

I finally came home before all the Christmas festivities to await our firstborn's arrival. The whirlwind just kept coming! I made it home just in time for my wife's water to break. My little boy was born on December 19, which, as we all know, certainly "I was bed-ridden and being taken care of like I was a child again (talk about humbling). changes life (in the best possible way), but also takes a lot of energy that I started to realize, I didn't have. I had become so distracted with work that I didn't realize my health was diminishing.

About four months ago I got down to around 125 pounds. I had hit my lowest of lows, and for a guy that is 6-foot-4-inches and that frail, I truly looked like I just got out of a concentration camp. This obviously led to needing to come off the road and shut it down for a while to focus on my health. Up until that time I had never struggled with a serious health issue, and I found it very difficult to be still and rest. Little did I know that this would be one of the best things to ever happen to me.

God never wastes a pain. Even when we are still and when the "doing" stops, when we feel our weakest and maybe even feel like we have nothing to offer, we can actually hear Him when all that striving has died down. We are loved not for what we "do," but because

I wasn't able to hold my son, let alone be the father I wanted to be. I wasn't able to be the husband I wanted to be. As I write this, I'm full of hope and even though I'm not in full remission yet, nor is everything perfect, and there are hard days, God has a way of working with imperfect people and imperfect situations, because our hope is in Him.

To anyone who might be struggling while reading this, trust me when I say, there is always hope. Sometimes we have to go through the strangest of journeys to discover real hope. Sometimes journeying into those depths gets you ready to climb great heights. Whatever journey you're on right now, hold on to hope. $\Box\BoxM$

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JESUS: THE ORIGINAL VIRAL MARKETING GURU AND WHAT THAT MEANS FOR YOUR CAREER

Chances are if you're reading this, you have at least an inclination towards a career in music ministry. It's also probably a safe bet that you're wanting to know how you can actually make a living doing this thing you love. And while finances and fame should never be your primary motivation, there are certain ways to appropriate both of them to expand your personal music mission, as well as provide a life for yourself and your family. And it all comes down to (pardon the ancient, slightly-modified cultural pun) WDJD—What did Jesus do?

I'm not talking about Jesus and his garage band making it to the big time. I'm talking about how Jesus approached the thing that will make or break you as a musician people. He knew his audience and He gave them content worth giving. It's about the importance of creating rich content, which will naturally draw people to you, whose lives you can then enrich, which will cause them to tell others about your ministry, which will in turn bring more people to you and the cycle continues. This is known today as viral marketing, and Jesus and His disciples had this strategy down to a T long before there was an i-Anything!

There was no richer content than the message Jesus brought to this earth. There was no better street team than the disciples who carried on the message of the cross after Jesus was crucified. These guys did not give up, they didn't buckle to rejection and they ultimately gave their lives for their mission. How's that for commitment to the call?

You may wonder how this relates to the independent artist, musician and songwriter. The short answer—in every single way... We are to pattern what we do, why we are doing it and how we are doing it based on our example, Jesus. Everything Jesus did pointed outward. He never pointed inward. His mission was to bring to this earth content that changed everything for everyone, and he ultimately gave up his life fulfilling that mission.

If you feel God is leading you to Christian music, you should do nothing less in your mission than what Jesus did in His. I see quite a few indie artists out there who are not committed to the missional path God has them on. They dabble at it, they invest capfuls of work and thimbles of faith in their mission, and they wonder why God isn't "blowing them up!" From what I have read in the Word, God does not care very much for dabblers, or for those who are lukewarm. Matter of fact, He spits them out. Yuck! Who wants to be spit out of God's mouth? So, what can you do to crank up the heat?

1- Be very sure your music mission is something you have time to pursue. If your life is not aligned in a way where you can invest resources, time and your talent, it may not be the time to pursue your mission fulltime. If you have debt, mortgage, obligations

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or other burdens, do not pursue your mission full-throttle until these issues are dealt with and resolved. Your life needs to be set up to allow you the freedom to pursue your music mission. If it isn't, you will experience many trials and much strife because you simply cannot devote what it takes to build a music mission. You need to be 100% ready, 100% willing and 100% able to pursue your music mission full-time and expect to support yourself from your endeavor.

2- If you have started your music mission, be sure that the content you are producing has value to others. Christian artists, musicians and songwriters have a very tough time self-evaluating their content. Why is this? It is because they are highly attached emotionally to what they have created. That's logical. We should be attached to what we are creating with the Creator. However, I see many out there who settle for mediocrity and believe God will make up for their lack of quality, or they simply do not know they are mediocre. And, Christians are notorious for telling artistic creatives they are "anointed" or great because they are afraid to discourage them by telling them the truth about their content. I personally welcome truthful criticism and never discount it or blow it off as someone not getting what I am doing. There is always some truth to be gleaned. (I also say this knowing full well that creatives are, in general, sensitive and can have their feelings hurt or damaged to a level that becomes counter-productive and even destructive. If this is you, make that a matter of prayer. Ask

God to help you receive instruction, learn from it and not internalize it as an attack on your personhood or your life's goals.)

3- Be passionate about your mission. Passion draws people to you as much or maybe more than excellence. Don't be arrogant, or think you are God's gift to humankind. (Jesus had that all wrapped up a long time ago.) There is a fine line between holy boldness and prideful arrogance. That line is called passion! If you are too far off that line, you are either a limp noodle who doesn't believe in your mission, or an egomaniac who is un-teachable and filled with pride. (Neither one of which is particularly attractive or inviting.)

4- In everything you do, point outward and upward—not inward. This isn't about what you get; it's all about what you give! I say give to give and leave the getting up to God. God will provide for you as you invest in your mission and strive for proficient vision (provision). You can do it with God's help! Actually, you can *only* do it with God's help. He knows that. And as soon as you learn that, the sooner you can walk hand-in-hand with Him into the bounty of the mission field He has placed before you. □□M

MISSION ENGINEERING REWAH PRO WAH PEDAL

Mission Engineering's ReWah Pro is a fresh new approach to the standard wah pedal. It rocks heel to toe very smoothly. With 4 switchable options (which can be mixed and matched simultaneously), this wah pedal adds a level of versatility for the serious guitarist. One of the challenges with some wah pedals is that they may only have the right characteristics for particular kinds of music. This pedal remedies that problem very well. Switch 1 increases gain and adds a bit of overdrive to the circuit. Switch 2 lowers the center frequencies slightly and reduces the width of the wah band. Switch 3 lowers the center of the filter band significantly for a bass-heavy wah. Switch 4 reduces the gain slightly, widening the filter for a broader response. I like this one especially for funk. To top this all off, the pedal is painted bright purple in a super durable chassis.

"WALK ON WATER" ARTIST: SHONLOCK ALBUM: A NIGHT TO REMEMBER

From the first contagious beats to the last vibrations of a perfectly placed note, Shonlock's latest album, *A Night To Remember*, is not only Shonlock's personal journey to grace; it's a sweeping sonic tale, chronicling the journey of everyman as he or she makes their way to God.
